



Lost-Time Injury Rate in Saskatchewan (AWCBC)




Average Lost-Time Injury Duration in Days (SK WCB Annual Reports)






Number of Time Loss and Non-Time Loss Injuries Among Non-Residents of Saskatchewan (SK WCB)




Lost-Time Physical Days vs. Lost-Time Psychological Injury Days (N=12,500 SK Employees)



Some of the Workers Who Have Died as a Result of their Work in Saskatchewan Since 2009
















What Do Young People think about Occupational Injuries in Saskatchewan?





% Responding "Agree" and "Strongly Agree" By Year






% Responding "Agree" and "Strongly Agree" By Region
